Hledick's school was one of several at "School Day" at the fair Friday. Her class is studying the Middle Ages, and seeing the period acted out in living color wasn't too impressive, she said. "I'm not into that stuff," she said, biting into a big piece of poultry. "But the turkey legs are yummy."

Even if you don't like turkey legs or singing pirates, Lady Donna said there's no reason to miss this year's fair.

"It's a beautiful day, and it's basically a free event," she said. "It's a wonderful chance to come out and play. Grown-ups don't play enough, and they need to play."

"You can go away being an entirely new person if you choose," Harvey the Corpsman added.

The 30th annual Medieval Fair continues from 10 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. today and Sunday at Reaves Park, on the corner of Jenkins Avenue and Constitution Street in Norman.

Admission is free, and free parking will be available at Lloyd Noble Center. A free shuttle will transport fairgoers from the Lloyd Noble Center parking lot.
